Points to Ponder...

One of the most important things to remember is that you must provide a proper house or shelter to protect your chickens from the weather. Baby chicks have down, not feathers, so they need a heat source until feathers develop.

By the time your pullets are 20 weeks old, each will require 4 square feet of floor space.

Do not give your chickens scratch grain or table scraps. Birds that are fed scratch grain will not lay as many eggs as birds that are fed a well-balanced complete feed.

You can expect each pullet to eat about 20 pounds of feed during the first 20 weeks.

70% of the cost of raising chickens is due to feed cost.

Raising chickens can be a great way to provide eggs for your family and friends, and livestock projects teach youth important life skills like responsibility and the value of hard work.

Consider exhibiting your pullets at local fairs, like the Smith County Fair on the River!

How Does the Chick Chain Project Work?

Livestock projects help teach youth responsibility. The Chick Chain is a good 4-H project because the care for chicks is not as costly as the care for a horse or a calf. However, chicks still require space, time, and money. Raising chickens is fun and rewarding, but be prepared to care for them!

The Chick Chain project is for 4-H members who have a place to raise and care for chickens at their home. The 4-H'er must purchase *either 12 or 24* baby chicks to raise. By purchasing chicks through the Chick Chain, the 4-H'er is also agreeing to exhibit and sell at least 3 hens at the 4-H Chick Chain Show and Sale in the fall. The money from the sale of the birds will be given directly to the 4-H'er from the buyer.

This year, you can choose from two breeds: **Black Australorp** and **Buff Orpington.** The minimum purchase is 12 chicks of one breed for \$40. The maximum purchase is 24 chicks for \$80. If you purchase 24 chicks, you can order 12 chicks of each breed or 24 chicks of one breed.
